### CHAPTER COUNSELOR REPORT

or many years, I've been fortunate enough to spend time with Nebraska Betas, get to know them, and appreciate their special qualities. For Beta alums who have not had a recent connection with the collegiate men who call 1515 R Street home, I want to make it clear that this is an amazing group of men. You can be assured that Nebraska Beta is in a good place right now.

I have often said that if three different aspects of the chapter are functioning properly, the Beta house will be moving in a positive direction. The first area is **Recruitment**. We've had some amazing recruitment leaders in recent years who have worked hard to sign some great young men each year. We've had new member classes of 30 or more, and we feel we could sign twice that many good candidates because of what we offer to college freshmen. The house has a great reputation, attracting many great candidates.

Next, we have a great **New Member Education program**. During the first semester that these men are on campus, they learn from the formal part of the program, the upper-class role models, the weekly grade checks, and the house culture. One added feature for the new members in the past two years has been a leadership class that all new members take. **Pete Allman '76**, an amazingly talented Alpha Tau Beta, teaches this class. (*Editor's Note: See the separate article about ALEC 102 in the New Member Ed report on page 3.)* In addition to all the other aspects of the program, they spend two and a half hours each week learning about leadership, human relations, and community service. This allows the men to reflect on their Beta experience and gives them the language and terminology to talk about their Beta experience.

The third aspect of a great chapter is selecting an outstanding **Leadership Team**. In the past several years, the chapter has been very serious and intentional about voting to select great leaders to serve in the 11 positions on the executive team. Elsewhere in this edition, there are articles from those leaders, and I'm sure you can tell that these are outstanding leaders who will do what is best to serve the chapter.

Because the three aspects of a good chapter are in place, the outcome can be seen in an outstanding GPA, awards at the Beta Convention, and awards at UNL campus activities sponsored by the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life. By any measure, the Nebraska Beta chapter is doing well.

To demonstrate the current status of the chapter, here are some quotes from the recent class of new members initiated in January. This class of 34 members had 10 with a 4.0 GPA. They completed community service activities and the ALEC 102 Human Relations class. Their top Clifton Strength was Harmony, with 15 members having it in their Top 5, which can be seen in how the members of this class interacted with each other. Here are some of their reflections:

he men of Beta had one of their best academic semesters over the fall, reaching an outstanding 3.62 all-house GPA. This put us second among city campus fraternities, third among all fraternities, and fourth among all Greek life. This GPA was almost 0.1 grade point higher than our spring average and could not have been achieved without the leadership of the Scholarship Team led by Will Wooden '23, with Jack Miller '24 and Tyler **Alexander '24** serving as the Assistant Scholarship Chairmen. (Editor's Note: Our chapter has 11 executive positions, but some positions have assistants who are integral in working with the executive. They are referred to as cabinet positions.) These men led the new members and weekly study hours and instilled in them the academic standards to which Beta holds its members. The new members were again put into teams captained by members of the Scholarship and New Member Education Teams. These teams allowed the new members to compete against each other to determine who could have the best grades and created a competitive and high-achieving environment for new members.

On top of all this chapter's success, the men of Beta also saw great individual success, with an outstanding 37 members achieving a 4.0 GPA, the most in the chapter's history! Of these 37, 10 were new members who contributed to the new member class, having a cumulative GPA of 3.75, falling just short of the record mark of 3.77 set by last year's freshmen. The sophomore class led all classes, with 18 members achieving 4.0s. These fine scholars will be rewarded with the semesterly Princeton Dinner, a formal dining event funded by the chapter. With how these grades have been trending, the Princeton Dinner budget may have to be increased for future semesters, which is a happy problem.

The spring semester has been off to a strong start, with the brothers continuing to hold themselves to high academic standards. It's a rare night where you won't find members in the basement study area or the library hard at work studying and collaborating on projects. This is also the first semester during which the new minimum GPA of 3.0 will be in effect. (Editor's Note: In September 2024, the chapter passed a new bylaw stating that all members [new members and actives] must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.0. Members not maintaining a 3.0 GPA may be placed on academic probation.) This change should lead to even greater diligence and work ethic among all house members toward striving for academic excellence.

Finally, I congratulate the newly elected Assistant Scholarship Chairmen, **Jack Naujokaitas '25** and **Tyson Klein '25**. Jack and Tyson both achieved 4.0 GPAs over the fall and were seen as academic and social leaders in their class. They will be instrumental in helping the next new member class and the chapter achieve even higher levels of academic success.



## New Member Education Report

This past January, Alpha Tau chapter initiated 33 members into the chapter. This class found impressive success both in the classroom and with the transition to college. The freshman class ended with a 3.76 GPA, touting one of the highest freshmen marks in our chapter's history. They also went above and beyond in implementing Beta's value of cultivation of intellect, and our chapter could not be prouder of the strides these young men made during their brief time in the house.

In addition, the chapter recently elected two freshmen as Assistant New Member Educators for the coming year: **Theo Schmidt '25** and **Val Sewell '25**. Both individuals are highly personable and passionate about Beta, and we look forward to advancing our new member education experience. I am excited and lucky to work with these men this semester and in the fall.

This past fall semester, we were privileged to implement a second year of our ALEC 102 course as part of our new member program. ALEC (Agricultural Leadership Education and Communication) is part of the general education requirement for UNL classes. More information on these classes is available in the fall 2023 issue and spring 2024 issues of *The Dragon's Tale*.

The 3-credit hour course proctored by the University allowed us the opportunity not only to contribute to our new members' ACE requirements but also helped them to develop their interpersonal communication and leadership skills further. Former New Member Educator and current President Nathan Siy '23 led the course to great success. Nathan ensured that the course ran smoothly in its second year with the help of our supportive advisor, Pete Allman '76, who was the course's instructor every Tuesday night for the semester. I am excited and grateful for the opportunity to step into this position with the strong support from our advisors and the chapter in continuing Alpha Tau's legacy in tremendous new member development.

My background: I am a sophomore from St. Louis, MO, pursuing my CPA and triple majoring in accounting, economics, and finance. I could not be more enthusiastic and appreciative about the opportunity given to me to be the New Member Educator for this upcoming semester and develop a strong class of new Betas. My experience within the new member program was extremely special and valuable to me, and I would wish nothing more than to give the same mentorship and guidance that was given to me back to the next generation of Men of Principle. I am fully prepared to dive head first into this role and contribute to the enriching and engaging journey that is Beta's new member program.


### PHILANTHROPY REPORT

s the spring semester winds down, I congratulate Sam Weyeneth '23 on winning the Interfraternity Council's 2025 Outstanding Philanthropy Program in February. This award recognizes the philanthropy program having the most community impact on the UNL campus.

This semester has also been a success. Our biggest event of the year, Backpack in Black, was on April 11. We joined forces to continue an ongoing tradition between Phi Delta Theta, Sigma Phi Epsilon, and Pi Kappa Alpha. The Battle of the Bands-style concert was held at the Bourbon Theatre in downtown Lincoln, and donations were raised to renovate the Malone Center at 2032 U Street—just east of the UNL campus and south of Vine Steet. The Center, founded in 1955, is determined to improve social and economic conditions and increase understanding between all races. Pete co-founded our leading philanthropy, Lincoln Lighthouse. 
### INTRAMURAL REPORT

### MENTORING REPORT

his fall marks the 11th year of Alpha Tau's mentoring program. Over 175 alumni have been engaged and offered value to Beta undergraduates' college experience. A common theme among alumni who mentor is, "It is very rewarding!" As a mentor, you are matched with your mentees in their sophomore year and see them through graduation. As you can imagine, most of these relationships last beyond college. Typically, the mentor may be paired with the mentee based on career paths, but many other factors come into play. They could include hometowns, hobbies, sports (participation, such as golf), spectator sports, reading or music, etc. Representatives of the undergraduate chapter, as well as several alumni, are involved in this process. The mentees obtain an alumni member chosen by The Experience Company to add value to their collegiate experience and guidance in transitioning to the professional world.

We anticipate needing 34 mentors next fall. We are seeking AT alumni in all fields! Do you have a couple of hours a month to share your accumulated experience and knowledge? Please review the Experience Company link at nebraskabeta.com/become-a-mentor. Ideally, a mentor should be four or five years out of school and have "real-world" experiences. With Zoom technology, alums can mentor from anywhere on the globe. We have had mentors from 27 different states outside of Nebraska. Mentors and mentees should plan to meet on some basis at least twice a month.

Alpha Tau chapter has seen a significant increase in engineering majors these past few years, so we are especially looking for mentors with a STEM background (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics). We are confident that we will continue to have "successful pairings" regardless of the mentor job experience and the college majors. Mentor training will probably occur in August (in-person but with available Zoom), and matches will be announced in mid-September. After reviewing the above-named site, an application can be completed online and sent to us through the "Submit" button if you want to be considered a mentor.


